November is a month of chance: change of seasons, weather, and the look of the sanctuary. November is also a month of special Sundays beginning with All Saints' Sunday on November 2nd, then two Sundays of "ordinary time" or "the 22nd and 23rd Sundays of Kingdomtide," then Christ the King Sunday, and finally, the first Sunday of Advent.

Our liturgical color changes will keep Marianne Morgan busy changing the paraments. We begin with white for All Saints', change back to green for 2 Sundays of Kingdomtide, then again to white for Christ the King Sunday, and finally to purple (the color of royalty) for Advent.

Our worship themes for October and early November are as follows:

November 2nd – **All Saints' Sunday:** Each year, we take time on the first Sunday of November to remember and celebrate the lives of those who have crossed the bar and joined the Church Triumphant. Using both Ephesians 1:11-23 and Luke 6:20-31, our message will be "Ultimate Blessings." The service will include communion and lifting the names of those who have gone to glory since our last All Saints' Service.

November 9th: Is prayer really important? Apparently, God thinks so. In Jeremiah 29:4-7, the prophet speaks on behalf of God asking the people of Israel to pray for Babylon, the city where they are being held captive. In Luke 18:1-8, Jesus tells us to pray always. Our message will be "A Life of Prayer." This week's special music will be provided by the children of *Noah's Little Ark Christian Preschool* at the 10:30 AM service.

November 16th: In the Lord's Prayer, we ask that we not be led into temptation. While God will do his part, we need to know how to avoid temptation. Is it a temptation to be around nonbelievers? Should we avoid being with atheists, Muslims, Jews, and those of other faiths? This week, we will address the issue using two seemingly conflicting passages. We will read from 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13, where Paul is telling the church to avoid those living irresponsibly, and from Luke 19:1-10, where Jesus invites himself to the home of a man of ill repute. Our message is titled "Should I or Not?"

November 23rd – Christ the King Sunday: The ugliest of all fights are church fights. When the people of God cannot get along, we damage the kingdom when it turns into a fight. So what do we do? This week, we will read from Jeremiah 23:1-6 and Luke 23:33-43 to see if we can make sense out of our Christian duty to be peacemakers – even in church. Our message will be "Blessed are the Peacemakers."

November 26th – Thanksgiving Eve: We think of Thanksgiving as a peculiarly American holiday, but it has roots in our Old Testament faith. This year, the *Palmyra United Methodist Association* (PUMA) is again sponsoring a Thanksgiving Eve service. The location is the *Campbelltown United Methodist Church* (on Horseshoe Pike near Hinkle Road) and the time is 7:00 PM. The message will be delivered by the Rev. Zimran Khan. Pastor Zim serves *Gravel Hill UMC*.

Advent: The season of Advent is a season of preparation for the arrival of God on earth in the form of Jesus Christ. This year, our Advent messages will be in the form of a sermon series on "The Big Picture." Often, we focus on what Jesus' birth means to us as individuals, but the big picture is a plan for all people. Attend all four Sundays of Advent to hear "The Big Picture."

November 30th – The First Sunday of Advent: Isaiah is a prophet to the people of Judah, but his message is a message of hope for all people. This week, we focus on Isaiah 2:1-5, where he explains how Jerusalem will become the place where **all nations** will come to know God. In addition to Isaiah, we will be reading from Psalm 122. Our message will be "For All People."

December 6th – The Second Sunday of Advent: This week, we turn to Isaiah 11:1-10 to hear how God will bring about his plan for a new relationship with all God's people. Our readings will be supplemented with selections from Psalm 72. The message is "Justice and Righteousness."

Volunteer Opportunities

Palmyra First Church offers many opportunities to put your faith into action. Below are just a few of the opportunities available:



Sunday Morning Opportunities:

Greeters: There are many opportunities to help people have a high-quality experience every Sunday morning. We are looking for people to greet our visitors, members, and friends. The task is as simple as being a friendly face, offering a bulletin, mentioning the service opportunities of the week, and for visitors, pointing the way to coffee, restrooms, Sunday School rooms, and the sanctuary.

Liturgist: Our liturgist's tasks vary depending on the service. At the 9:00 AM service, the liturgist reads the scriptures after the pastor explains what to listen for and offers the Prayer for Illumination. At the 10:30 AM service, the liturgist leads the call to worship, occasionally leads a responsive reading as well as reading scriptures.

Mission Opportunities:

Palmyra First Church is involved in a variety of missions. You can be a part of a HUB packing party where cleaning (flood) buckets and health kits are assembled. Another option is to volunteer at the Caring Cupboard, helping provide food for our neighbors in need. On the first Friday of the month, Palmyra First sponsors First Fridays with First when we work with Habitat for Humanity, rebuilding homes for first-time home buyers. With Habitat, you can learn some basic home building and repair skills. And remember, there is a job for every skill level – even if you think you have no building skills!

There are just a few of the missions we are involved in. Watch the newsletter and bulletin for other opportunities to be the hands and feet of Jesus.

Property Maintenance:

Our A/V team does all the things necessary to live cast our regular services, funerals, and other special events in the Sanctuary. For some services, it can involve projecting things to the large screen at the front of the sanctuary. Other jobs include turning the microphones on and off while adjusting volumes. A third job is to use a joystick to aim the camera where it needs to be.

Administrative Tasks:

While Heidi does a fantastic job in the church office, she can only do so much! Volunteers help with folding and stuffing bulletins as well as preparing our weekly mailings to the unwillingly absent members and friends. We also need seasonal help with special mailings to the full mailing list of members and friends

We also use volunteers to keep the books, issue checks to pay our bills, prepare bank deposits, and prepare our financial statements.
