

We all have our preferred methods of communication. According to the song "Knock Three Times," by Tony Orlando and Dawn, the singer has two suggested methods: knocking on the ceiling, or alternately on the pipes. (Given the rest of the song, I presume he would prefer the three knocks on the ceiling!) While knocking on the ceiling or the pipes is a bit unusual, we do have a variety of ways to communicate including in person conversations, via telephone call, Zoom calls (and many similar video call options), text messaging, email, snail mail, or smoke signals, and even semaphore signals. Which do you prefer?

For me, it depends on the type of message to be sent. For urgent matters, telephone calls are my preferred method and are much preferred over texts and emails. My phone dings with so many notifications I may not realize there is an urgent message until later. For a message with detailed information, I will need to use later, an email works well. Texts work well for short messages, but often a face-to-face discussion is the best. It is harder to detect emotions and moods using more remote communication methods.

Sometimes people assume the pastor will know about a variety of situations, but the reality is, unless someone takes the time to keep me informed, I will be in the dark. Anytime you or your family have anything you would like to share with your pastor, don't hesitate to give me a call, and if appropriate, we can arrange a face-to-face meeting.

Another thing to understand about communications with your pastor is its confidential nature. Conversations between pastors and congregants are granted many of the same protections as lawyer-client privileges. On a practical level, I will be happy to add you and your situation to my personal prayer list, but without your explicit consent or instruction, to protect your privacy, I do not add things to the church prayer chain.

With God, of course, communication is easier with less options. The primary method is prayer. Whether prayer takes place in the privacy of your bedroom and on your knees, head bowed, and eyes closed, or eyes wide open while driving, or in a group setting, God will be attentive and hear your

prayer. Therefore, remember to always stay in communication with our God no matter where you may be.

The month of August marks the end of Summer, the anticipation of changing seasons, and a return to a more normal pace of life. For the most part, vacations are behind us, Labor Day, school, Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas loom on the horizon.

On the Christian Calendar we continue in the Season of Kingdomtide, the longest season of the year. Our liturgical color is green, symbolizing growth.

Our worship themes for August and early September will be as follows:

August 3rd: What are you asking of Jesus? Sometimes our requests are inappropriate, and such is the case with our reading from Luke 12:13-21. With support from Colossians 3:1-11, we will explore the appropriateness of our priorities in life and in our relationship with Christ. The message will be titled "Priorities."

August 10th: One of our best churchy words if "faithful," but want does it mean? This week, we will look to Isaiah 1:1,10-20, Hebrews 11:1-16, and Luke 12:35-38 for some clues to the correct answer. Our message will be titled "Being Truly Faithful."

August 17th: While we all want peace and quiet in our homes, in our lives, and in our church, sometimes we need to take action on important issues. This week, we will refer to Hebrews 11:29-12:2 and Luke 12:49-56 for some advice on when we need to sit back and let things happen and when we need to be actively engaged with both God and the world around us. Our message will be titled "The Activist Christian."

August 24th: What makes our worship acceptable to God? This week, we will be reading form Hebrews 12:18-29 and Luke 13:10-17 to see if we can more fully understand what is acceptable to God and what is not acceptable. Our message will be "Acceptable Worship."

August 31st - **Labor Day Weekend:** Showing hospitality to strangers is not always easy, but it is our Christian obligation. In the book of Hebrews, we are reminded of our obligation. In the Gospel recorded by Luke, Jesus gives us a lesson on how to be a good guest. Between the reading from Hebrews 13:1-8, 15-16 and Luke 14:1, 7-14, we should be able to discover how to be hospitable. Our message will be "The Good Guest and the Good Host."

September 1st: While we acknowledge God has made us, we also know God gave us free will, and therefore we are responsible for our own actions. In the book of Jeremiah God is likened to the potter at the wheel molding us. Are you moldable by God or are you hardened and fragile? Based on Jeremiah 18:1-11 and Luke 14:25-33, our message will be "Moldable or Fragile?"

Volunteer Opportunities

Palmyra First Church offers many opportunities to put your faith into action. Below are just a few of the opportunities available:

Sunday Morning Opportunities:



Greeters: There are many opportunities to help people have a high-quality experience every Sunday morning. We are looking for people to greet our visitors, members, and friends. The task is as simple as being a friendly face, offering a bulletin, mentioning the service opportunities of the week, and for visitors pointing the way to coffee, restrooms, Sunday School rooms, and the sanctuary.

Liturgist: Our liturgists tasks vary depending on the service. At the 9:00 AM service, the liturgist reads the scriptures after the pastor explains what to listen for and offers the *Prayer for Illumination*. At the 10:30 AM service, the liturgist leads the call to worship, occasionally leads a responsive reading as well as reading scriptures.

Mission Opportunities:

Palmyra First Church is involved in a variety of missions. You can be a part of a HUB packing party where cleaning (flood) buckets and health kits are assembled. Another option is to volunteer at the Caring Cupboard by helping provide food for our neighbors in need. On the first Friday of the month, Palmyra First sponsors First Friday's with First when we work with Habitat for Humanity rebuilding homes for first time home buyers. With Habitat, you can learn some basic home building and repair skills. And remember, there is a job for every skill level – even if you think you have no building skills!

These are just a few of the missions we are involved in. Watch the newsletter and bulletin for other opportunities to be the hands and feet of Jesus.

Property Maintenance:

We have a dedicated group of individuals who help maintain both the Birch and Green Street campus and the *Seltzer Retreat Center*. Some cut the grass at both facilities, others rake leaves, pick up fallen tree limbs, pull weeds, water flowers, and rake mulch into place.

Inside the building, we have people who keep the kitchen equipment clean, do minor repairs, change lightbulbs, change the clocks, and so many other things.

There is a maintenance opportunity for everyone.

Audio/Video Team

Our A/V team does all the things necessary to live cast our regular services, funerals, and other special events in the Sanctuary. For some services, it can involve projecting things onto the large screen at the front of the sanctuary. Other jobs include turning microphones on and off while adjusting volumes. A third job is to use a joystick to aim the camera where it needs to be.

Administrative Tasks:

While Heidi does a fantastic job in the church office, she can only do so much! Volunteers help with folding and stuffing bulletins as well as preparing our weekly mailings to the unwillingly absent members and friends. We also need seasonal help with special mailings to the full mailing list of members and friends

We also use volunteers to keep the books, issue checks to pay our bills, prepare bank deposits, and prepare our financial statements.
